Over the past 8 weeks, five Year 9 and 10 Indigenous students have participated in the Tweed-Mullumbimby Leadership program 'Wollumbin Dreaming'. This program focusses on developing leadership skills, cultural

identity and teamwork amongst within the Indigenous community. Each week the program focusses on a key topic which is extremely beneficial to the development of good team leaders. Participants have been lucky enough to take part in many cultural activities such as an Interpretive Cultural Kayak Tour, Traditional basket weaving, Aboriginal Art, Boomerang history and painting, Traditional dance, and learning the Bundjalung language. They have also had guest speakers from the local Indigenous community address important topics such as Integrity, Awareness, Communication, Advocacy and Acceptance.

On Monday, 9 September 2013, the Board of Studies sent an email to all Year 10 students inviting them to <u>activate their Students Online account</u>. Year 11 students who have not yet activated their <u>Students Online</u> account will also be sent an email.

<u>Students Online</u> is a website designed specifically for senior students as their source of information from Year 10 to the HSC. All students in Years 10, 11 and 12 can now log in to their personal account section called 'My Details' and see their personal study information and contact details.

Students need to have an email address recorded on the Board's system to be able to activate their account. Schools should submit any outstanding email addresses for their Year 10, 11 and 12 students via <u>Schools Online</u> as soon as possible.

Grades for Year 10 and Year 11, as well as Year 12 HSC results, will be released via <u>Students Online</u> on the following dates:

- Year 11 Grades available from Wednesday, 13 November 2013
- Year 10 Grades available from Wednesday, 11 December 2013
- Year 12 HSC results available from Wednesday, 18 December 2013

Asthma Foundation NSW has issued an alert for people with asthma warning more than 700,000 people who live with asthma in NSW to be on alert for smoke from bushfires and high pollution levels.

"Exposure to bushfire smoke or high levels of other air pollutants could make asthma symptoms worse and trigger a potentially fatal attack," aid Michele Goldman, CEO of Asthma Foundation NSW. The poor air quality issue is also compounded with Sydney also having a "high" pollen count. We will be issuing daily pollen counts from 16 September on our <u>website</u> on <u>Facebook</u> and <u>Twitter</u>.

If your staff or students exposed to bushfire smoke, air pollution or pollens, you can reduce the effects on their asthma by:

• Unless ordered to evacuate, stay indoors, close all windows and doors. If you have an air conditioner, switch it to recycle or re-circulate.

• Postpone outdoor sporting or exercise activities to when there is a lower risk of bushfire and the Regional Pollution Index (RPI) is medium to low. More activity means deeper breaths, so the particles can be drawn further into the lungs.

• If you are in your car, put the air system onto re -circulate to reduce your exposure to smoke.

• Use your asthma action plan if your asthma starts to get worse. If your symptoms aren't improving with use of your reliever medication, seek medical assistance.

Make sure you and people around you are familiar with Asthma First Aid.

Five of our Aboriginal students have just finished the Wollumbin Dreaming Aboriginal Leadership program. They presented their project including survey results to a large audience at Tweed Heads Bowling Club. These students are showing wonderful leadership and the community should be proud of them.



Young People and Risk Taking

Risk-taking in adolescence it is an essential part of learning and personal development. Every healthy adolescent takes risks as he or she grows towards independence. Most researchers agree that if there is no risk there is no growth. A common problem for some young people is their inability to evaluate the potential risks and consequences of everyday behaviour. Thrill seeking, speeding, the desire to impress one's friends; feelings of invincibility and the search for new experiences are all motivating forces that drive many teenagers. As a result they are over represented in every category of risk taking resulting in injury and trauma.

The RRISK Program aims to reduce risk-taking behaviour associated with alcohol and drug use, driving and partying amongst year 11 students in the North and Mid North Coast of NSW. RRISK is relevant to the social life, developmental stage and concerns of adolescents. It extends the school based drug education and road safety curriculum by providing opportunities for senior high school students to develop knowledge, attitudes and skills to reduce risk taking and develop safer celebrating strategies.

Over 4500 students from more than 59 high schools from Port Macquarie to Tweed Heads have registered to attend one of 10 RRISK Seminars. This year, two additional seminars will be held in Port Macquarie and Kempsey to meet the growing demand. If you have a year 11 student in your family, encourage them to attend.
