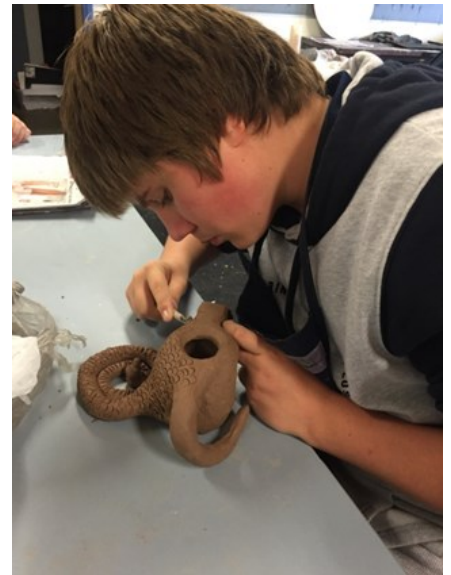
Visual Arts / Photography

MEASLES ALERT

NSW Health has notified the public of a recent outbreak of measles in the Sydney area. NSW Health is urging people to take advantage of the free measles vaccine, available at GPs, and to look out for measles symptoms. Symptoms to watch for include: Fever, Sore eyes, Cough, Following fever, sore eyes and cough - a red, blotchy rash typically spreading from the neck to the rest of the body that follows three to four days later.

Measles is mostly spread by coughing and sneezing. Students and staff who have been in close proximity to individuals with measles should be monitored, and consult with a doctor if they are showing signs of any of the symptoms mentioned above. Individuals who have measles should not attend school. Please contact and advise the school.

YEAR 10 SUBJECT SELECTION EVENING

Students have completed their Career Match activity with Southern Cross University. Tonight (Monday 22nd May 2017) will be our Year 10 Subject Selection Evening where students will receive a lot of advice so that they can make informed decisions around their first preferences for subjects for 2018. We encourage parents to attend to be able to have informed discussions with their children when making these important decisions. We recognise that it is a complex process and wish to provide useful information and advice along with sufficient time for the process. I would also like to reinforce that due to the large number of potential combinations of subjects that many students will be in a situation where some of their initial choices and combinations cannot be accommodated and other subject choices will need to be considered. SCHOOL UNIFORM

The school uniform is the expected standard of dress for all students at the school. The Banora Point High School uniform policy was developed by the School Executive and the school's P&C Committee in accordance with the NSW Department of Education and Communities policy and guidelines on School Uniforms in New South Wales Government Schools.

It has been designed to be comfortable for students' to wear, with the current uniform a collaboration of students' thoughts and ideas gained from students' survey. The uniforms are a symbol of recognition of students at the school and upon enrolling their children at the school, parents agree to support and reinforce the wearing of school uniforms with their children.

The uniform expected to be worn by students at BPHS is detailed later in the newsletter. The school is currently working with our P&C, SRC and our uniform providers Back To Basics, to find a suitable shorts option for girls. **Our male students are expected to wear plain navy blue shorts as per usual. These shorts are not to have stripes or logos (unless it is the schools logo) present on them.**

Unfortunately a small number of students are attending school out of uniform. A particular issue is our male students wearing black shorts. If students are not in the correct uniform and do not have a uniform pass, staff will refer them to a Deputy Principal, where student's no compliance with the school's procedures will be managed consistent with the school's discipline procedures.

Details of the opening hours of the schools uniform store are included in an advertisement later in the newsletter. BPHS also has some second hand uniforms for sale. Our **second hand uniform sales** function through the kind donations of parents and students who no-longer have use for their school uniforms. Through these donations, we are able to provide access to low cost uniforms. Any funds raised through the sale of second hand uniforms is deposited into the student welfare assistance fund, used to support students and their families during times of hardship.

Please approach the office administration staff regarding second hand uniform purchases. All donations of quality second hand uniforms are valued and appreciated.

NUMERACY INITIATIVES

Improving students' literacy and numeracy is a priority for Banora Point High School and part of our Strategic Direction 1, Maximising learning outcomes through effective teaching and learning strategies in our School Plan. Initiatives are more likely to be sustained if they are developed with a whole school focus.

In schools, numeracy is an integral component of learning and critical thinking across all curriculum areas. It requires students to develop the ability and disposition to use and interpret mathematical concepts, skills and representations fluently and critically, so that they can operate successfully and purposefully in diverse contexts. To ensure that our school has substantial and enduring changes to numeracy practices we require a whole school response that includes school planning, monitoring and reviewing of processes in collaboration with school communities and parents.

An effective starting point for us is to undertake a 'numeracy audit' to provide information about numeracy demands across the curriculum, to inform school judgements about action that needs to be taken and to extend teachers' knowledge about strategies required to develop students' numeracy. We are seeking the views of parents and the community on numeracy at Banora Point High School to help us in our audit process. NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2017 the following vaccines will be offered:

YEARS	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine	2-doses in 2017 at least 6 months apart*
	Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine	Single dose
	Varicella vaccine (chickenpox) – catch-up	Single dose
Years 11-12	Meningococcal ACWY vaccine – Tuesday 30 th May 2017	Single dose

* The second dose of HPV vaccine is being delayed to later in the year (at least 6 months after the first dose) to allow the recently-announced Meningococcal ACWY Vaccination Program to be offered to students in Years 11 and 12 from Term 2 when the second dose of HPV vaccine is usually given. There is no harm for Year 7 students in delaying the second dose of HPV vaccine and further advice for parents will be provided later in the year regarding HPV course completion.

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- read all the information provided
- complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- return the completed consent form to their child's school
- ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that students who commence HPV vaccination in school clinics in Year 7 but do not complete the course during the school year may be offered catch-up doses at school in Year 8. Students who have any HPV doses at their GP will be advised to complete the course with their GP.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation.

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic as a physical card.

Parents/guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

School Dress Code

The school uniform is the expected standard of dress for all students at the school.

It has been designed to be comfortable for students' to wear, with the current uniform a collaboration of students' thoughts and ideas gained from students' survey.

The uniforms are a symbol of recognition of students at the school and upon enrolling their children at the school, parents agree to support and reinforce the wearing of school uniforms with their children.

If students are not in the correct uniform and do not possess a uniform pass or parent note, staff will refer them to the Deputy Principal, where if students are found to be in breach of the Uniform Dress Code they could be liable to a loss in Good Standard Status.

JEWELLERY

The Occupational health and Safety Act 2000 requires that students are not exposed to risk of their health or safety, therefore all jewellery or other items that could, with reasonable foreseeability, cause an injury to themselves or other students are not to be worn.

Acceptable jewellery is as follows:

- ◆ One pair of small sleepers or small studs.
- ◆ Watch
- ◆ One small flat ring
- ◆ A small necklace worn under the uniform

If in the opinion of staff, students do not adhere to these guidelines, they will be required to make the necessary changes to conform to this policy



Uniform Catalogue Code of Dress Policy

MAKEUP

If a staff member considers a student to wear an excessive amount of makeup, the student will be asked to remove it, notably by washing it off.

SKIRTS

Skirts must be worn at a modest length, staff may request students to make changes if seen to be warranted.

HATS

Students and staff are encouraged to wear hats/caps, but these must be removed whilst in school buildings. Head wear must not contain promotional material.

SHOES

Plain black shoes with firm leather uppers are a standard part of the school uniform and must be worn at all times with the uniform.

Appropriate footwear (e.g. sports shoes) and hats (if outside) must be worn during physical education sessions.

GROOMING

On arrival at school, students are required to be clean and well groomed, their uniforms must be neat and tidy.

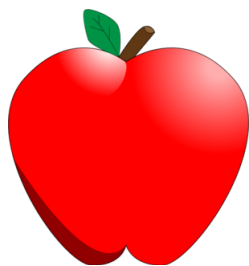
