COMPUTER PROGRAMMING @ BPHS

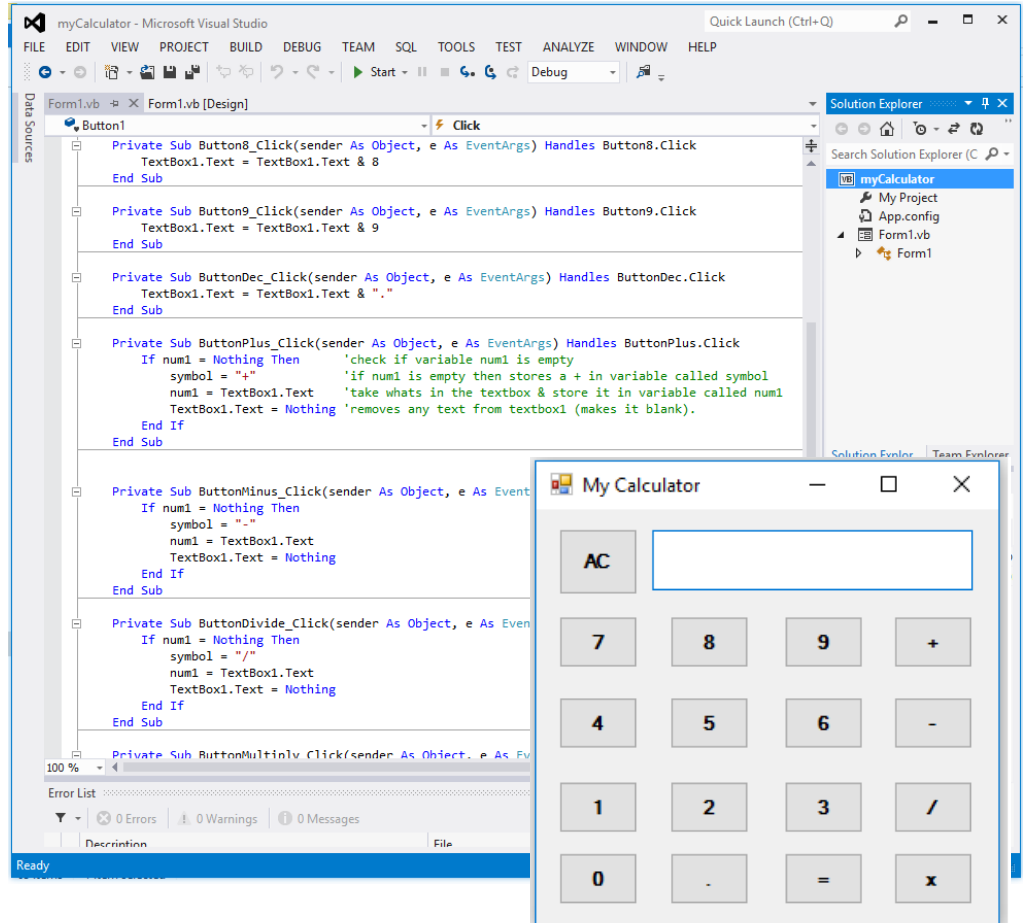
Each year students studying Information Software and Technology experience a broad range of technology based learning opportunities including the study of artificial intelligence, robotics, digital media, the internet, website design and for a whole term they study software development and programming.

Our current Year 9 students have been learning to design and write code using an industry standard programming language to produce working computer programs. They learn real world industry standard transferable skills.

For many students this is their first encounter with programming. Any nervousness or trepidation quickly shifts to confidence as they start to create simple programs and build upon their learned knowledge.

Students learn to create programs that interact with the user, make decisions and perform calculations to solve problems.

Before the end of the term, students demonstrate their coding ability by completing their own assignment based on a traditional guessing game.



Participating students find the programming activities to be extremely enjoyable activities as it boosts their confidence and ability every time their programs work!

SCHOOL-BASED TRAINEESHIP

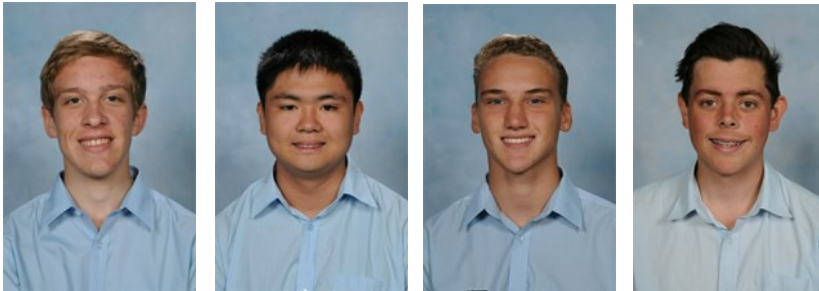

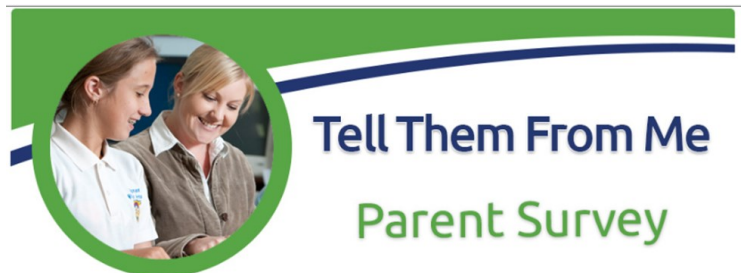

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL, YEARS 10-12

The completion of HSC studies for our year 12 students is fast approaching. As you are aware the Trial Exams have concluded and students are now back in class studying.

How students approach their study in the weeks leading up to the HSC examinations, beginning on the 16th of October, can make a big impact on their performance. It is vital that students are still attending all of their classes. In most classes the required course content is still being completed, while in others essential revision is being undertaken. The expert guidance provided by teachers and the collaboration between students studying the same course is a valuable examination revision resource that must be utilised by all students.

A reminder of the leave pass conditions for year 12 students. Students who have a leave pass can arrive late to class if they do not have a period 1 class. They are to arrive to class 15 minutes before period 2 and sign in at the office. If students do not have a period 5 class, students can leave school at the start of lunch signing out at the office. On Mondays, students are permitted to sign out at the beginning of period 4 if they do not have a period 4 or 5 class.

Students who have a study period must be using it effectively by completing course work or revision in the library. Students are not permitted to leave the school in a study period unless the leave meets the leave pass conditions or permission is obtained from the Acting Deputy Principal.

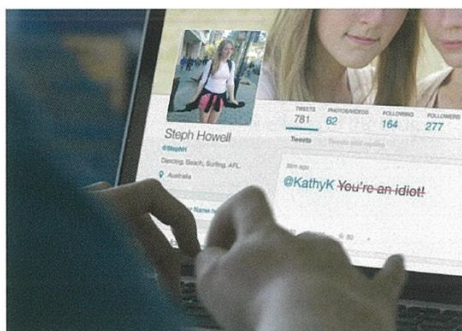

reword™



WHAT IS REWORD?

Reword is a not-for-profit, joint initiative between, headspace and communications agency Leo Burnett Melbourne that was launched in March, 2016. The tool was created as a way to curb the more than 463,000 instances of cyberbullying amongst young Australians every year.

Reword is the first technology of its kind in Australia. It works by identifying inflammatory language in real time to prompt online users to reword their messages or posts. Similar to grammar check functionality, a red line appears through words to highlight bullying behaviour, encouraging online users to reconsider their choice of words.

The results to date have been incredible:

- Over 900,000 installs of Reword
- Young people responded to the red line, rewording 87 per cent of insults detected
- 67 per cent reduction in bullying behaviour per user
- Introduced to over 250 schools across Australia

headspace CEO Jason Trethowan, said Reword is an invaluable tool that helps young people rethink the impact their words have on other people.

“Reword’s success comes from asking young people to stop and think before acting,” Mr Trethowan said.

“This can ultimately have a massive impact on the social and emotional wellbeing of young people.”

headspace Head of Clinical Practice Vikki Ryall said throughout the last 12 months, there had been a hugely positive response to Reword.

“We’ve seen how it is possible to impact and stop negative online behaviour in real time,”

Reword also enables and encourages young people to collaborate and co-author the ‘new’ bullying terms as part of the tool’s lexicon, keeping it accurate and up-to-date.

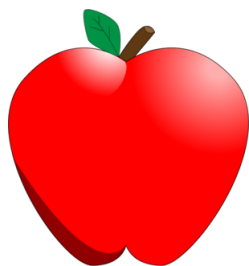
